

Dear Friends. Praised be Jesus and Mary!

When a young woman is received as a postulant in the Congregation of Mary Immaculate Queen, the bishop or priest performing the simple ceremony places a Miraculous Medal around her neck with these words: "May this medal of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary be an outward symbol of a pure and undefiled heart aflame with love for the Immaculate Queen whom you have pledged yourself to serve, and strengthen you against the attacks of the world, the flesh and the devil." At this investiture the postulant receives the first item of the Holy Habit that she will wear throughout her life of consecration. As she takes each step in her religious life, she will receive one or perhaps two more pieces of the habit until at last, at final profession, she receives the ring which completes the uniform of her dedication. As she places her Miraculous Medal around her neck every morning, each Marian Sister from the youngest postulant to the oldest professed kisses the medal and says the prayer in-

scribed on it, "O Mary, conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee."

Let us take a few moments to review the history of this medal and the saint through whom Our Lady gave it to us.

After the death of her mother, nine-year-old Catherine Laboure went before the statue of Our Lady in her home and said, "Now, dear blessed Mother, you will be my mother." From that time, she managed the household for her father, and eventually the farm as well. She still managed to find time to spend in prayer in the village church.

At the age of 24, Catherine was finally free to enter the novitiate of the Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul. In July of that same year (1830), while she was still a postulant, Catherine was awakened in the night by a child who bade her come to the chapel where the Blessed Virgin awaited her. During that first visit, while Our Lady sat in the director's chair, Catherine knelt beside her and placed her hands in Mary's lap while they conversed for about two hours. During the following November, Our Lady appeared to Sister Catherine during the evening prayers of the community. Around her was an oval frame

with the words now so familiar to us, "O Mary conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee." Then the apparition turned to reveal the back side of the medal: the letter M surmounted by a cross, with the hearts of Jesus and Mary pictured below it, and surrounded by 12 stars. Our Lady instructed Catherine to have a medal made in this likeness, and that many graces would be received by those who wore it about their neck. The only person Sister Catherine ever told about these visions was her confessor. He did not believe her at first, but eventually passed the message on to the Bishop, who had 2,000 medals made. The miracles and conversions resulting from the use of the medal were so

numerous that people began calling it "the Miraculous Medal."

Throughout the years of her religious life, Catherine never told a single soul about the apparitions. She worked hard taking care of the elderly, and managing the convent farm. Her life of union with God and the Blessed Virgin grew deeper every day. She became a saint, not because she saw Mary, but because she lived a heroically virtuous life doing her ordinary actions for the love of God. One last thing that Our Lady had requested remained to be done: to have a statue made. In order to accomplish this, Catherine finally had to break her long silence, and tell her superior about the visions. It's a good

thing for us, or we might never have known the story of this admirable saint! Catherine died

at the age of 70. Her incorrupt body is encased in glass in the chapel of the Sisters of Charity in Paris.

So, back to postulants. In our last issue we were looking forward to the arrival of postulants. During the last weeks of Septem-
